Smoke Detectors: Do you have the Right One
Installed in your Home?

In my 40-year career as a public servant and firefighter it has become clear that not all smoke detectors are the same. While drifting by the smoke detector display at a hardware store, I was reminded of an experience I had at Home Depot. A customer was intently looking at the information so I asked if he knew what he was looking for. He replied no, and welcomed some assistance. The fact is the majority of people do not know what to look for when it comes to smoke detectors.

How many homes go unprotected by a disabled smoke detector because it became a nuisance? Set off by smoke from cooking or annoyed by the relentless chirps leads to many removed smoke detectors that are never replaced. One thing I know for certain is a smoke detector sitting on the counter without a battery does not work. I have found many smoke detectors sitting on the shelf while the empty smoke detector bracket hangs on the wall. Consider the cost of a 9-volt battery (around \$1.00-\$1.50), isn't your family's life worth more than that? Why would anyone procrastinate when it comes to fire safety?

How many people know that a difference in smoke detectors even exist? There are essentially two types of smoke detectors - the Ionization (I) and the Photoelectric (P). Why? Honestly, I believe to create confusion and profits for the manufacturer. The Ionization smoke detector has proven not to work and yet it is installed in 90% of the US homes. How one manages to stay in production despite this fact is beyond understanding. Tests performed by Texas A&M in 1995 demonstrated the ionization smoke detector failed to provide adequate egress time to escape. Despite innumerable lawsuits against this type of detector, production continues as do purchase and use. Now, they combine it with a photoelectric smoke detector claiming you need both, when all you need is the one that works (photoelectric type).

It is my belief and experience as a firefighter that smoke will always appear first. The old saying, "Where there is smoke there is fire" holds true in that where there is fire there is most certainly smoke. The photoelectric smoke detector, provides the advanced warning before the flame.

Photoelectric smoke detectors provide superior performance and activate 100% of the time. Next time you go to replace the batteries replace your smoke detectors instead. Use photoelectric smoke detectors and recommend to your friends to do the same. The label on the detector will let you know which type the builder installed in your home. Take the time to check it out (look for the I or the P) and insist on protecting your family with the photoelectric smoke detector. If the detector mentions anything about radioactive materials in the very small print on the label, it is an ionization detector.

Your family and your life are worth it, purchase the best protection the Photoelectric Smoke Detector, maintain the battery, practice your escape plan and have a meeting place.
